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Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing is an international, scientific, open access periodical published in accordance with independent, unbiased, and double-blinded peer-review principles. The journal is the official online-only publication of İstanbul University-Cerrahpaşa Florence Nightingale Faculty of Nursing, and it is published triannually in February, June, and October. The publication language of the journal is English. However, the journal accepts both Turkish and English manuscripts. The authors of the Turkish articles are required to send English version of their article after their manuscript is accepted.

The aim of the journal is to publish original research papers of the highest scientific and clinical value in nursing research, practice, education, and management issues. Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing also publishes reviews, rare case report and letters to the editors.

The target audience of the journal includes nurses, academicians, clinical researchers, medical/health professionals, students, nursing professionals and related professional and academic bodies and institutions.

The editorial and publication processes of the journal are shaped in accordance with the guidelines of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE), World Association of Medical Editors (WAME), Council of Science Editors (CSE), Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE), European Association of Science Editors (EASE), and National Information Standards Organization (NISO). The journal is in conformity with the Principles of Transparency and Best Practice in Scholarly Publishing (doaj.org/bestpractice).

Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing is indexed in PubMed Central, Web of Science-Emerging Sources Citation Index, DOAJ, Scopus, and TUBITAK ULAKBIM TR Index.

All expenses of the journal are covered by the İstanbul University-Cerrahpaşa. Processing and publication are free of charge with the journal. No fees are requested from the authors at any point throughout the evaluation and publication process. All manuscripts must be submitted via the online submission system, which is available at www.fnjn.org. The journal guidelines, technical information, and the required forms are available on the journal's web page.

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INFORMATION TO AUTHORS

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Originality, high scientific quality, and citation potential are the most important criteria for a manuscript to be accepted for publication. Manuscripts submitted for evaluation should not have been previously presented or already published in an electronic or printed medium. The journal should be informed of manuscripts that have been submitted to another journal for evaluation and rejected for publication. The submission of previous reviewer reports will expedite the evaluation process. Manuscripts that have been presented in a meeting should be submitted with detailed information on the organization, including the name, date, and location of the organization.

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- 2. Drafting the work or revising it critically for important intellectual content; AND
- 3. Final approval of the version to be published; AND
- Agreement to be accountable for all aspects of the work in ensuring that questions related to the accuracy or integrity of any part of the work are appropriately investigated and resolved.

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On the other hand, changes in authorship and authors' information after submission can only be implemented upon the Editorial Board's approval. In such cases, authors must provide the journal with a formal letter explaining why the change is needed. If the Editorial Board approves the request, the journal will seek approval of all contributing authors and new Copyright Agreements will be collected from the authors.

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Preparation of the Manuscript

Title page: A separate title page should be submitted with all submissions and this page should include:

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- Name(s), affiliations, highest academic degree(s), and ORCID IDs of the author(s),
- Grant information and detailed information on the other sources of support,
- Name, address, telephone (including the mobile phone number), and email address of the corresponding author,
- Acknowledgment of the individuals who contributed to the preparation of the manuscript but who do not fulfill the authorship criteria.

Abstract: An abstract should be submitted with all submissions except for Letters to the Editor. The abstract of Research Articles should be structured with subheadings (Aim, Method, Results, and Conclusion). Please check Table 1 below for word count specifications.

Keywords: Each submission must be accompanied by a minimum of three to a maximum of five keywords for subject indexing at the end of the abstract. The keywords should be listed in full without abbreviations. The keywords should be selected from the National Library of Medicine, Medical Subject Headings database (https://www.nlm.nih.gov/mesh/MBrowser.html).

Manuscript Types

Original Articles: This is the most important type of article since it provides new information based on original research. Acceptance of original papers will be based upon the originality and importance of the investigation. The main text of original articles should be structured with Introduction, Method, Results, Discussion, and Conclusion and Recommendations subheadings. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Original Articles.

Statistical analysis to support conclusions is usually necessary. Statistical analyses must be conducted in accordance with international statistical reporting standards (Altman DG, Gore SM, Gardner MJ, Pocock SJ. Statistical guidelines for contributors to medical journals. Br Med J 1983: 7; 1489-93). Information on statistical analyses should be provided with a separate subheading under the Materials and Methods section and the statistical software that was used during the process must be specified.

Units should be prepared in accordance with the International System of Units (SI).

Clinical Trials

Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing adopts the ICMJE's clinical trial registration policy, which requires that clinical trials must be registered in a publicly accessible registry that is a primary register of the WHO International Trials Registry Platform (ICTRP) or in ClinicalTrials.gov. The name of the registry and the registration number should be provided in the Title Page during the initial submission.

Data Sharing

As of 1 January 2019, a data sharing plan is required for the registration of clinical trials. Authors are required to provide a data sharing statement for the articles that reports the results of a clinical trial. The data sharing statement should indicate the items below according to the ICMJE data sharing policy:

- Whether individual deidentified participant data will be shared
- What data in particular will be shared
- Whether additional, related documents will be available
- When the data will be available and for how long
- By what access criteria will be shared

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Clinical trial and data sharing policy of the journal will be valid for the articles submitted from 1 March 2020.

Editorial Comments: Invited brief editorial comments on selected articles are published in the Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing. Editorials should not be longer than 1000 words excluding references. Editorial comments aim to provide a brief critical commentary by reviewers with expertise or with high reputation in the topic of the research article published in the journal. Authors are selected and invited by the journal to provide such comments. Abstract, Keywords, and Tables, Figures, Images, and other media are not included.

Review Articles: Reviews prepared by authors who have extensive knowledge on a particular field and whose scientific background has been translated into a high volume of publications with a high citation potential are welcomed. These authors may even be invited by the journal. Reviews should describe, discuss, and evaluate the current level of knowledge of a topic in clinical practice and should guide future studies. The subheadings of the review articles should be planned by the authors. However, each review article should include an "Introduction" and a "Conclusion" section. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Review Articles.

Case Reports: There is limited space for case reports in the journal and reports on rare cases or conditions that constitute challenges in diagnosis and treatment, those offering new therapies or revealing knowledge not included in the literature, and interesting and educative case reports are accepted for publication. The text should include Introduction, Case Report, and Discussion with an unstructured abstract. Please check Table 1 for the limitations for Case Reports.

Letters to the Editor: This type of manuscript discusses important parts, overlooked aspects, or lacking parts of a previously published article. Articles on subjects within the scope of the journal that might attract the readers' attention, particularly educative cases, may also be submitted in the form of a "Letter to the Editor." Readers can also present their comments on the published manuscripts in the form of a "Letter to the Editor." Abstract, Keywords, and Tables, Figures, Images, and other media should not be included. The text should be unstructured. The manuscript that is being commented on must be properly cited within this manuscript.

Tables

Tables should be included in the main document, presented after the reference list, and they should be numbered consecutively in the order they are referred to within the main text. A descriptive title must be placed above the tables. Abbreviations used in the tables should be defined below the tables by footnotes (even if they are defined within the main text). Tables should be created using the "insert table" command of the word processing software and they should be arranged clearly to provide easy reading. Data presented in the tables should not be a repetition of the data presented within the main text but should be supporting the main text.

Figures and Figure Legends

Figures, graphics, and photographs should be submitted as separate files (in TIFF or JPEG format) through the submission system. The files should not be embedded in a Word document or the main document. When there are figure subunits, the subunits should not be merged to form a single image. Each subunit should be submitted separately through the submission system. Images should not be labeled (a, b, c, etc.) to indicate figure subunits. Thick and thin arrows, arrowheads, stars, asterisks, and similar marks can be used on the images to support figure legends. Like the rest of the submission, the figures too should be blind. Any information within the images that may indicate an individual or institution should be blinded. The minimum resolution of each submitted figure should be 300 DPI. To prevent delays in the evaluation process, all submitted figures should be clear in resolution and large in size (minimum dimensions: 100×100 mm). Figure legends should be listed at the end of the main document.

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All acronyms and abbreviations used in the manuscript should be defined at first use, both in the abstract and in the main text. The abbreviation should be provided in parentheses following the definition.

When a drug, product, hardware, or software program is mentioned within the main text, product information, including the name of the product, the producer of the product, and city and the country of the company (including the state if in USA), should be provided in parentheses in the following format: "Discovery St PET/CT scanner (General Electric, Milwaukee, WI, USA)".

All references, tables, and figures should be referred to within the main text, and they should be numbered consecutively in the order they are referred to within the main text.

Limitations, drawbacks, and the shortcomings of original articles should be mentioned in the Discussion section before the conclusion paragraph.

Title Levels

First *Centered, bold, capital initial letters* The text starts with a new paragraph.

Second

Flush left, bold, initial letters uppercase The text starts with a new paragraph.

Third

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Fifth

Indented, bold, capital initial letters, end with a point The text begins on the same line with the title and continues as a standard paragraph.

References

While citing publications, preference should be given to the latest, most up-to-date publications. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of references If an ahead-of-print publication is cited, the DOI number should be provided. Journal titles should be abbreviated in accordance with the journal abbreviations in Index Medicus/MEDLINE/PubMed.

Both in-text citations and the references must be prepared according to the American Psychological Association (APA) 7th edition. Please see citation examples for different types below.

In the seventh edition, up to 20 authors should now be included in a reference list entry. For sources with more than 20 authors, after the 19th listed author, any additional authors' names are replaced with an ellipsis (...) followed by the final listed author's name:

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When submitting a revised version of a paper, the author must submit a detailed "Response to the reviewers" that states point by point how each issue raised by the reviewers has been covered and where it can be found (each reviewer's comment, followed by the author's reply and line numbers where the changes have been made) as well as an annotated copy of the main document. Revised manuscripts must be submitted within 30 days from the date of the decision letter. If the revised version of the manuscript is not submitted within the allocated time, the revision option may be canceled. If the submitting author(s) believe that additional time is required, they should request this extension before the initial 30-day period is over.

Accepted manuscripts are copy-edited for grammar, punctuation, and format. Once the publication process of a manuscript is completed, it is published online on the journal's webpage as an ahead-of-print publication before it is included in its scheduled issue. A PDF proof of the accepted manuscript is sent to the corresponding author and their publication approval is requested within 2 days of their receipt of the proof.

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EDITORIAL

Dear readers;

This year marks the 40th anniversary of the launch of Florence *Nightingale Journal of Nursing*. *Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing* is one of the oldest journals published in Turkey in the field of nursing. *Florence Nightingale Journal of Nursing* has achieved several successes since the publication of its first issue. It was accepted to the TR Index in 2009, the Emerging Sources Citation Index in 2017, SCOPUS in 2018, and the PubMed and DOAJ indexes in 2020. We aim to be accepted to SCI Expended in a short time. Over 700 articles have been published in our journal, which has been publishing for 40 years.

With the year 2020, we are witnessing important events affecting public health all over the world. Epidemics such as the new type of coronavirus, earthquakes, floods, landslides, air pollution, and migrating people... Nurses have an important place among health professionals in solving these problems. Nurses are always the leading health professionals due to their high number, qualified education, and high level of communication skills. In this context, in the first issue of 2021, I am honored to present 11 research articles and 1 case report containing evidence that nurses of all levels can benefit from.

Two of the original studies, "Perceptions of Clinical Nurses About the Causes of Medication Administration Errors: A Cross-Sectional Study" and "Effects of Day and Night Shifts on Stress, Anxiety, Quality of Life, and Oxidative Stress Parameters in Nurses" is about medication errors and working conditions.

Studies titled "Assessment of Frailty in the Elderly", "Effects of Obstetric Interventions During Labor on Birth Process and Newborn Health" provide important information in approaching individuals in different positions.

Studies titled "Evaluation of Gender Courses Offered in accord with the Curriculum of the Faculties of Health Sciences in Turkish Universities" and "Determining the Organizational Cultural Competence of Hospitals Located in the Coastal Strip of the City of Antalya" discuss university curricula and the hospitals' cultural competence. It can be stated that the results of these studies can be generalized due to the large sample size.

The articles titled "Professional Values in a Sample of Nursing Students from Different Countries" and "The Effects of Training About Prevention of Factors Associated with Musculoskeletal Symptoms on Nursing Students Affectivity" address nursing students' professional values and musculoskeletal problems.

The article titled "Autonomy Levels and Professional Attitudes of Nurse Educators" provides new insight into the professional attitudes of nurse educators.

Two other studies titled "Evaluating Occupational Stress Levels of the Railway Workers", "Caregiver Burden and the Level of Perceived Social Support of Caregivers Helping with Inpatient Care of Patients with Gynecologic Cancer" are on occupational health and gynecologic cancer.

Another original study titled "Translation and Psychometric Testing of the Healthcare Environment Survey in Turkey" is methodological.

The study titled "*Transitioning Nursing Students' Education from Traditional Classroom to Online Education during the COVID-19 Pandemic: A Case Study Applied to the Meleis Trial*" provides important information about the transition to online education during the COVID-19 Pandemic.
